ABOUT

WIA: The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) of 1998 was the first major reform to the education and training opportunities funded by the federal government in over 15 years. The funding provides education and training to eligible individuals to enhance their current skills or learn a new trade. WIA provides the framework for a national workforce preparation and employment system designed to meet both the needs of the nation's businesses, the needs of job seekers and those who want to further their careers. WIA also provides funding and services for Georgians who lose their job as a result of plant closures, mass layoffs, and other effects of the changing economy.

GMWIA: The Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Area 2 (GMWIA) is one of twenty (20) WIA areas in Georgia. The office is located in Gainesville, Hall County, Georgia and is operated by the Georgia Department of Labor. The Area is comprised of the following thirteen counties: Banks, Dawson, Forsyth, Franklin, Habersham, Hall, Hart, Lumpkin, Rabun, Stephens, Towns, Union and White. (See page 22 for GMWIA staff member contacts).

Note: residents in the bordering states of North and South Carolina will need to contact their local WIA office for assistance.

GMWIB: The Georgia Mountains Area 2 Workforce Investment Board (GMWIB) is comprised of the former Private Industry Council (JTPA/PIC) as well as new members. The GMWIB is responsible for providing policy guidance and exercising oversight with respect to the local workforce investment system conducted under the Workforce Investment Act in partnership with the Georgia Mountains Council of Chief Elected Officials (CCEO).

IMPORTANT: *Application for the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) program does not create an entitlement to services, and nothing in the Act shall be construed to establish a right for an individual to obtain services under WIA.*

VISION STATEMENT

The vision for the Georgia Mountains region is to promote and provide employment, training, and rehabilitation opportunities to the citizens of the Georgia Mountains area. This will be achieved through the following goals:

1. To enhance the workforce development system that has been created to dramatically upgrade individuals, workplace skills, economically benefiting the workforce, employers and the State of Georgia;
2. To continue eliminate unwarranted duplication of services, reduce administrative costs, and enhance participation and performance of customers served through a quality driven system;
3. To provide a cooperative working relationship, to facilitate joint planning and evaluation of services, and to develop more efficient management of limited financial and human resources. To foster and facilitate a true no wrong door approach to services;
4. To provide universally accessible information for the general population with wide and easy access to a comprehensive array of information in a variety of formats.

QUALIFICATIONS AND ELIGIBILITY

The Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Area 2 office receives its funding from federal funds that have been allocated to the State of Georgia. The following eligibility criteria apply to Adult and Dislocated Workers:

Adult - Must be 18 years of age or older, provide documentation to support the "right to work" as well as compliance with the Selective Service Act (if applicable). Depending on funding levels, applicants with a barrier to employment may be given priority.

Dislocated Worker - Must provide documentation to support the "right to work" as well as compliance with the Selective Service Act (if applicable). Must meet one of the following definitions:

- A. An individual who has been terminated or laid off, or who has received a notice of termination or layoff, from employment; is eligible for or has exhausted entitlement to unemployment compensation; or has been employed for a duration sufficient to demonstrate, to the appropriate entity at a one-stop center referred to in section 134 (c), attachment to the workforce, but is not eligible for unemployment compensation that were not covered under a State unemployment compensation law; and is unlikely to return to a previous industry or occupation;
- B. An individual who has been terminated or laid off, or has received a notice of termination or layoff, from employment as a result of any permanent closure of, or any substantial layoff at, a plant, facility, or enterprise; is employed at a facility at which the employer has made a general announcement that such facility will close within 180 days; or for purposes of eligibility to receive services other than training services described in section 134 (d)(4), intensive services described in section 134 (d)(3), or supportive services, is employed at a facility at which the employer has made a general announcement that such facility will close;
- C. An individual who was self-employed (including employment as a farmer, a rancher, or a fisherman), but is unemployed as a result of general economic conditions in the community in which the individual resides or because of natural disasters; or
- D. An individual who is a displaced homemaker:
 - a. An individual who has been providing unpaid services to family members in the home is unemployed or underemployed and is experiencing difficulty in obtaining or upgrading employment, and
 - b. Has been dependant either on public assistance and whose youngest child is within two years of losing eligibility; or
 - c. Has been dependant on the income of another family member, but is no longer supported by that income.

SUITABILITY FOR WIA-FUNDED SERVICES

All customers must be determined suitable for WIA-funded Adult services by a WIA staff member or knowledgeable GDOL Career Center staff member. Suitability is determined by examining some or all of the following items:

- Length of training program
 - Financial aid award/denial
 - Household budget
 - Support system
 - Reliable transportation
 - Assessment scores/program choice
 - Current marketable skills

REASONS FOR DENIAL OF WIA-FUNDED SERVICES

Customers making application to the Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Area must meet the eligibility criteria set forth in the Plan and the Workstatement. Customers may be denied services based on:

- eligibility
- suitability
- growth and demand occupations in the Georgia Mountains area
(See page 12)
- ineligible training provider
- inability to attain employment that would maintain or increase income
- current marketable skills

All customers denied services based on the above criteria will receive written notification delivered by the United States Postal Service. A copy of the notification is kept in the customer file and maintained in the Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Area office.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: Do I have to repay any of the funds I receive from WIA?

A: No, WIA is a federal grant program, not a loan. However, receiving funds through fraudulent means would require repayment and possibly other legal penalties.

Q: Do I need permission to change classes or programs?

A: Yes. Keep in mind that GMWIA only assists with one (1) program of study. Your choice is documented at the time of intake/application, and in the Enrollment Agreement.

Q: What happens if I need to drop out of school?

A: Customers are required to communicate any and all curriculum changes, or personal situations that may impact their program completion, with their Case Manager. Concerns of this nature are handled on a case-by-case basis. GMWIA funding may not be approved in future applications.

Q: Am I allowed to work during my training?

A: Yes, as long as you maintain full-time student status as defined by your Training Provider, and you do not let work interfere with your studies and/or grades. Please keep in mind that it is your responsibility to know and understand the guidelines of the various funding sources that you may be receiving, such as Pell, HOPE, and unemployment insurance.

Q: How long do I have to complete my training?

A: 104 weeks (2 years) is the maximum allowed time. This time frame includes all remedial, developmental and/or provisional courses. Certain medical conditions are the exception and will be handled on an individual needs level.

Q: Does WIA pay for books and supplies?

A: Yes, if applicable, your HOPE book allowance (usually \$100 per term or semester) must be used first before GMWIA Book Vouchers are used. Also, GMWIA has specific policies for required program components or supplies and a dollar limit is placed on certain items. *(See ITA section on pages 9-11)*

Q: Do I have to report WIA funds to the Internal Revenue Service?

A: No, WIA training funds and/or supportive services payments are not taxable and do not need to be shown on your income tax returns. Please speak with a CPA or tax preparation professional for more detailed information.

INDIVIDUAL TRAINING ACCOUNT (ITA)

Revised 01/13/10

An individual determined eligible for WIA-funded training services may select a provider from the Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Board/STATE approved list after consultation with a GMWIA representative.

Policies:

1. Training must be in occupations identified in the local WIA plan as “growth and/or demand occupations” or documentation of employment prospects for areas not listed in the WIA plan must be provided. Growth and Demand Occupation lists are subject to change at any time due to changing economic conditions.
2. Training must result in an employment wage sufficient to maintain or increase income.
3. ITAs may be utilized for expenses related to training, including but not limited to the following: books, tuition and fees, general supplies, tools, uniforms and shoes, certification, licensing, testing fees, drug testing for entrance into training, medical requirements for training entrance, etc. **Due to procurement regulations, certain required equipment cannot be purchased utilizing WIA funds (computers and related equipment).
4. Funding limitations will be as follows:
 - (a) Up to \$5,500 in training costs, excluding support, may be expended for each participant for the first year of training.
 - (b) For training that extends beyond one year, total training costs may not exceed \$8,500, excluding support.
 - (c) The total cost of training may exceed the available WIA funding limitations; however, customers must provide evidence that additional financial support is available to cover the total training cost.
5. Programs should not exceed 104 weeks (two years). Exceptions to this policy may be approved on a case-by-case basis and requests should include evidence that financial support is available during extended training periods. In addition:
 - (a) The Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Area (GMWIA) assists with one (1) program of study.
 - (b) An upgrade to a degree program is not permitted due to the length of program guidelines, available funding, and Individual Training Account (ITA) requirements. A downgrade from a degree or diploma credential level program, or lateral change of

program within the same credential level may be allowed based on documented statements or evaluations by the Training Provider, and the GMWIA Case Manager or in cases of documented medical conditions.

- (c) A customer cannot change their major, program of study or add/drop a course without prior approval by their Case Manager. In the event of withdraw/failure of a course or program, GMWIA will not provide the funds to re-enroll in that course at a later date.
6. All customers must maintain full-time training status as determined by the training provider. Exceptions to this policy may be approved on a case-by-case basis at the case manager's discretion. Please refer to the Pell/HOPE Policy regarding on-line/internet-based classes.
 7. In general, all training programs must be within a reasonable commute (30-40 miles one way) of the WIA local area. Out-of-the-area training programs that are not within commuting distance to the WIA local area may be approved on a case-by-case basis. All approved training must be located within the contiguous United States. Lodging may be provided by some training providers (CDL of GA, LLC, Daly's Truck Driving School or Georgia Driving Academy) either free or at a reasonable cost. WIA funding may be provided for lodging if the customer lives outside of a reasonable commute (30-40 miles one way) or if reliable transportation is not available.
 8. All potential training customers must apply to the potential training site and apply for all applicable sources of financial aid. Upon application to GMWIA for training services, applicants must provide proof of acceptance to the training program and financial aid award/denial letter, if applicable. All customers who apply for training services must complete a Customer Financial Summary and provide information that will explore all available sources of financial aid (i.e., Pell, HOPE Grant, HOPE Scholarship, TANF) to avoid duplication of services.
 9. WIA funding may be provided for college level instruction only if all of the following conditions have been met:
 - (a) The customer must be accepted into a certificate, diploma, or degree program and the course of study must be occupation-specific (i.e. radiology technician, accounting, teacher certification). No funds shall be provided for general academic programs (i.e. General Studies, Bachelors of Art, etc.).
 - (b) Total course of study will take no longer than 104 weeks (2 years) to complete and be a certificate, diploma, or degree program.
 - (c) The customer must demonstrate that he/she has the financial resources to attend long-term training.

10. Continuing Education and other similar courses may be approved if the following conditions apply:

- (a) The customer must have a specific occupational goal;
- (b) The customer must have a work history or educational background that relates to the occupational goal;
- (c) The customer must present evidence describing how the proposed training will increase his/her employment marketability;

Please note: Trade Act Assistance (TAA) funds are not approved for Continuing Education courses.

11. Customers accepted on a provisional basis by a Training Provider may receive assistance but certain restriction and requirements apply and are reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

12. ITAs will not be used for payment of late fees caused by customer error or delay. The customer will be responsible for these fees as he/she is responsible for other fines or penalties.

ITAs will be issued for training providers/programs that are currently on the State of Georgia Eligible Provider/Program List and with whom we have a signed WIA Training Provider Agreement/Contract. The Georgia Mountains WIA office maintains a list of the providers with executed contracts through the Georgia Department of Labor Grants and Contracts office in Atlanta. This list is updated as needed.

GROWTH AND DEMAND OCCUPATIONS

**Although this list represents the area "growth and demand" occupations, it does not breakdown the "training" requirements of each occupation. This information can be found in the Directory of Occupational Titles. Many of the occupations listed below DO NOT REQUIRE significant training or may require only on-the-job training. Some occupations may require pre-hire letters. Due to the economy, some of these occupations require detailed proof of the demand in the area in which the customer lives or plans to commute. Please consult the GMWIA office regarding your training needs. Additional occupations will be added as determined by the Georgia Mountains Georgia Department of Labor Career Center managers and members of the GMWIB.

All training must allow the customer to become self-sufficient. The following occupations have been determined to be growth and demand occupations for the area as of January 28, 2009:

Customers desiring to attend a provider that only appears on the State-approved list would need to speak with a WIA representative to get more information on how a State-approved provider may be approved by the Georgia Mountains Workforce Investment Board.

Additional training providers may be added by the local Board as it is deemed necessary. Please be advised that this list is subject to change.

FINANCIAL AID FACTS

- You must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress to remain eligible for ANY Financial Aid.
- You must maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average (GPA) each term to continue receiving WIA-funded training and/or WIA supportive services.
- All Financial Aid must be re-applied for each year.
- Always apply for Financial Aid, even if you think you won't qualify.
- Those who already possess a Bachelors degree are not eligible for Pell Grant (may not be eligible for HOPE after Spring 2004).

Frequently Asked Financial Aid Questions and Answers

1. **What is the Pell Grant?** Pell Grant is a Federal Grant Program that does not have to be paid back. It is a needs-based grant.
2. **When do I apply for Financial Aid?** The sooner the better! For Pell, you must include your tax information. So, as soon as you get that completed, it is a good idea to get a jump start on the next year's Pell Grant application.
3. **What is the difference between HOPE Grant and HOPE Scholarship?** Georgia residents who are attending a Georgia public technical college to earn a certificate or diploma are eligible for HOPE **Grant** regardless of high school date or grade point average. The HOPE **Scholarship** Program for students attending public institutions was created beginning with the 1993-1994 Award Year (State Fiscal Year 1994). The program is fully funded by the Georgia Lottery for Education and administered by the Georgia Student Finance Commission. Eligible students seeking a college degree from a Department of Technical and Adult Education or University System of Georgia institution may receive HOPE **Scholarship** funds covering the full cost of tuition, certain approved mandatory fees, and a book allowance of up to \$100 per quarter or \$150 per semester.
4. **Why can't I receive Pell Grant for developmental classes?** Federal regulations require a student to be fully accepted into an eligible program before receiving Pell Grant. Applicants who are admitted on a developmental basis are ineligible to receive financial aid until they reach admission status.
5. **How do I know if I qualify for the Pell Grant?** Eligibility is based on several factors including the number of family members, number in college, and family income. You must be in a program of study to qualify for Pell.

GUIDE TO GMWIA ASSISTANCE

Visit your local DOL Career Center (*page 16*) and register for Employment Services. Explore available jobs in the area. Receive free Core and Intensive Services to determine skill level. Individuals determined in need of skills upgrade may be referred for WIA-funded training.

Apply for admission to a program which will train for a growth and demand occupation (*page 12*) at the school you plan to attend (at technical colleges, take the ASSET or COMPASS entrance exams). To receive WIA funding, the training Provider and Program must be on the Georgia Mountains Approved Providers and Programs List, and you must enroll full-time (12 credit hours). View the webpage: www.gmwia2.com/approvedproviders.html for more information.

Apply for Financial Aid -- Pell & HOPE, if applicable. (See *also* Financial Aid Facts on *page 14*)

Receive acceptance letter from the approved provider stating chosen program of study, and fax it to the GMWIA Intake Specialist.

Do not sign any loan applications or contracts until WIA training is approved.

Contact the GMWIA office at 770-538-2727 for required paperwork or download and complete forms from website. Forward by mail, fax or hand deliver all paperwork to GMWIA office; and contact GMWIA Intake Specialist about progress and any concerns.

Complete *applicable* skills assessments -- CAPS, TABE, GCIS Skills Assessment, CDM, ASSET, COMPASS, Mavis Beacon, O'NET-- and discuss selected training program and suitability.

Complete and submit results of the background check/drug screen to GMWIA for training programs such as Allied Healthcare programs and Commercial Driver training as a prerequisite to eligibility and/or completion of a licensed occupation.

If eligible, meet with an assigned Case Manager to complete your GMWIA Enrollment Agreement, ITA, and receive necessary forms. Stay in contact with your Case Manager during training.

Complete and submit to Case Manager the results of the Certified Work Ready Certificate assessment during the last quarter/semester of program of study.

Within 30 days of completing training, update resume, visit placement office at school/DOL Career Center and discuss job search assistance with your GMWIA Case Manager.

Complete training and any required testing for licenses and certifications.

Meet with your assigned Case Manager to review your program, submit your credential and discuss your employment status.

Stay in touch with the Performance Specialist every three months for 12 months after training to update your employment status.
